

Financial Statement

Our continuing challenge has been to meet the intensive educational, clinical and behavioral needs of our students. With 82% of our student population in the poverty range, the need for outreach services linking students and families to available resources has increased dramatically. Tuition is paid by the State and local jurisdictions, but these funds do not cover the supplemental programs our students often require to succeed in school. Financial support from the community enables The Foundation Schools to introduce creative approaches to pursue our mission to prepare students to be productive and successful in their future academic and career paths.

REVENUE



88% of revenue is spent providing programs and direct services for our students. According to the American Institute of Philanthropy, most highly effective charities spend 75% or more on programs. The Foundation Schools has been awarded the Independent Charities Seal of Excellence for meeting the highest standards of public accountability and program and cost effectiveness.


"So sit back and watch because I'm not done.

THE FOUNDATION SCHOOL OF MONTGOMERY COUNTY GRADUATION SPEECH

I first began attending the Foundation School of Montgomery County in the fall of 2010 after going to an alternative school where things didn't work out for me. I returned to the Montgomery County Public Schools' Central Office and they told me I would be coming to The Foundation School. At first I was hesitant and unsure if that was where I really wanted to be.

When I arrived for my intake I went in with a bad attitude, ready to dislike the school. I found fault in everything. The classes were too small and the staff and my peers were annoying. I let my anger get the best of me and I would get suspended, leave school without permission, and sometimes choose not to come to school at all. I was well known for my bad attitude and would regularly cuss at teachers. I felt like I could never win. I felt like everything was unfair and that they were always picking on me. My grades fluctuated between good and bad. One quarter I would get A's and B's then the next quarter, C's and D's. There were many challenges I had to face in my personal life which also made school a challenge when I was trying to balance everything on my plate. Although my challenges would overwhelm me for a time, I was always able to persevere and make sure I earned my credits.

Despite my initial reaction, being at The Foundation School benefited me in the end and made a difference in my life and my well-being. Over time, I believe I matured and learned to trust the staff and use the supports I had in place. I had a unique high school experience, going through two pregnancies, while working and attending school as I worked toward the goal of earning my high school diploma. Many people doubted that I would continue with school and make it here today, but I proved them wrong. It took a lot of growing and maturing to make it through. There were a lot of bumps in the road but I stuck with it through thick and thin. My faith and my determination helped me to persevere. Many times I thought of being mainstreamed back to my regular school, but after spending time at The Foundation School, I knew this was the best place for me to be. I'm thankful for the support I received



and in the end it changed my life for the better for me and for my kids. Today I feel I have a better attitude toward life and a better understanding of people.

The advice I have for the future graduates is to stay focused on your goals and stay focused on you. No one else is living your life, so make good choices and think about your future. Have faith in yourself when no one else does, and keep pushing because at the end of the day we all have a story and we all go through things in life. Some people's struggles may be worse than others, but we can all have a happy ending.

I would like to share a poem I wrote about this day:

I made it... After this long journey I made it.
Through the doubts and haters I made it.
After I wanted to give up so many times I made it.
Through the unfairness and stress I made it.
Through not wanting to wake up and go, I made it.
Through the skipping, suspensions, and storming out,
I made it.

For how long it took for me to learn, I made it.

How long it took for me to grow and mature into, I made it.

I don't regret anything I've done because I made it.

If no one else had faith I did and look where I am, I made it.

So sit back and watch because I'm not done.

There's still another journey to accomplish and

I'll MAKE it again.

PROFILES IN SUCCESS

SHANAZIA

"Without my anger being in control of me, I will be successful in life."



Shanazia T. came to The Foundation School in 2010 after her public school was unable to handle her behavioral and anger issues. While attending The Foundation School, Shanazia learned to deal with her frustrations, express her feelings appropriately, and ignore negative peer interactions. "I didn't get the help I needed until I came to The Foundation School."

Shanazia has found outlets for her anger through poetry and dance. Her poetry is featured on a web site where she hopes it will inspire others. She is a member of the Raw Element Dance Company, a group which performs at charity events.

Shanazia's goal is to attend a four year college and eventually become a child psychologist or social worker. She wants to "give someone the help I didn't get when I was young." Shanazia made Honor Roll three quarters last school year and made significant academic improvements during her time at The Foundation School. She has successfully transitioned back to the public school system. Shanazia says, "Without the help and support from The Foundation School I would have been either in jail, residential, or kicked out of school because of my anger. But coming to The Foundation School, I've learned that fighting is not the answer, nor is violence. I've also learned that without my anger being in control of me, I will be successful in life."

When Aaron S. came to The Foundation School, he was dealing with emotional outbursts and had been kicked out of two public schools within a matter of months. In his own words, "Aaron four years ago was horrible. Cursing teachers out, flipping desks, throwing things, getting restrained, and leaving school without permission." Aaron initially struggled at The Foundation School and was angry about his placement. However, after dealing with a significant loss in 9th grade, Aaron realized that, "the staff really do care." Aaron then began focusing on and working toward his ultimate goal of transitioning back to public school. "I'm trying my best. I think about it (transitioning) every day."

Aaron has, in fact, left The Foundation School and is transitioning back to the public school system through the Pathways re-entry program. Despite his rocky start, Aaron appreciates what The Foundation School has done for him and now respects the staff and the program. "I believe there are people here that can help you. The staff really cares about kids like myself. They want us to succeed. They don't want to see us in jail or dead by 21."

Collin M. enrolled at The Foundation School of Montgomery County (FSMC) in 2012 after several public school placements. While Collin was academically strong, he struggled emotionally in school, demonstrated poor self-control, and had difficulty with anger management.

After starting at FSMC, Collin improved in managing his emotions and learned to seek support from staff to help him handle conflicts and concerns in an appropriate manner. Collin learned new leadership skills which he demonstrates both in his classroom and throughout the school community. Outside of school, he takes an active role in volunteering in his neighborhood. Collin was able to make this transformation by setting goals for himself and working with his therapist to change his behavior and remain determined.

This past June, Collin was able to accomplish his ultimate goal of transitioning back to the public school system. Before leaving FSMC, Collin reflected on his time here and said, "I am glad I found the right place for me and was able to feel successful at school after a really rough couple of years."

Demia L. enrolled at The Foundation School of Montgomery County (FSMC) in 2012 after struggling with aggression and unsafe behaviors toward herself and others. At FSMC, Demia attends weekly individual counseling sessions to work on improving her self-esteem, problem solve peer conflicts, and discuss strategies to manage her anxiety with school work. Demia has also become an active participant in the pet therapy program and has used the skills she is learning to work through frustrating feelings.

Since her enrollment, Demia has made honor roll every quarter and was chosen by staff as a student ambassador to help new students adjust to the school. In the future, Demia hopes to attend college at Howard University, own her own home, and have a dog. Without FSMC, Demia says, "I wouldn't have gotten the help that I needed."

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
